Introduction

Like councils up and down the country, Shropshire Council faces a very tough financial position and we need your help in shaping some difficult decisions that lie ahead.

The latest reporting shows that we are 80% of the way towards our £51.4m spending reductions target for this financial year, with five months left to report on. <u>Our plan</u> is to build on these strong foundations to overcome the challenges that still lie ahead into the next financial year and beyond.

Our biggest pressure is that the funding we have to deliver our services hasn't kept pace with the increasing demand that we are seeing, especially in adults' and children's social care, which makes up nearly 80% of the council budget.

Just as an example, the number of children in care in Shropshire has nearly doubled since 2018 and 30% of our residents are now over 60, with a growing number who need support. The cost of delivering this support is also higher than ever, due to stubbornly high rates of inflation.

Essentially, we are having to do much more with less so we can carry on supporting the most vulnerable people in our communities. To keep doing this, we will have to make some difficult decisions.

We will need to change the way we deliver some services, whilst others may need to stop altogether.

We want to understand your priorities, as residents, businesses, employees or stakeholders, so that any future decisions are made with these in mind.

This budget consultation is an opportunity for you to share your thoughts on how we can achieve the £50m spending reductions that we must make before 2025, which includes the 4.99% council tax increase that the Government allocation assumes we will make.

The themes include demand management, increasing efficiency, increasing income, reducing third-party spending and making sure that we are the right size as an organisation.

Council Tax

In its funding calculations for Shropshire Council, the Government assumes that we will increase council tax next year by 4.99%. This is made up of a 2% adult social care precept to support the growing costs of adult social care and 2.99% to support all other council services. In its funding calculations for councils, the Government assumes that Shropshire Council will increase council tax by this amount. Increasing council tax by 4.99% raises £10m for Shropshire Council. Not increasing council tax by this amount would add to the £50m spending reductions the council must find.

Capital Programme

Alongside an extensive transformation and efficiency programme, the Council is also planning to invest £136m in a capital programme in 2024/25. Capital projects are one-off investments typically into buildings or infrastructure or machinery. Capital funding cannot by law be used to meet the day-to-day costs of running council services - for example we cannot move money from a capital scheme to pay for adult social care costs. However we will consider investing in projects that will help deliver the Shropshire Plan priorities and also schemes that may help deliver efficiencies within the revenue budget. A breakdown of the major areas of capital spend as detailed in the Capital Programme for 2024/25 are detailed in the first chart below.

Within the Council's Capital Strategy, the Council also identifies priority capital schemes which are potential schemes that the Council will consider progressing to full business case prior to these being built into the formal capital programme. The Council has currently identified a further £266.25m of priority schemes to be considered for development over the next 5 years, and this will be funded primarily from external grants and contributions, prior to funding through capital receipt generation and borrowing. The Council always seeks to maximise external contributions and capital receipts to fund capital schemes. This then prevents the council taxpayer from directly funding any costs in relation to capital schemes.

The outline areas of spend for the priority schemes are as follows and includes schemes such as the Shrewsbury Smithfield Riverside Development, Swimming in Shrewsbury, North West Relief Road, development of Primary and Secondary schools across the county, Bridgnorth Town Centre Traffic works and SpArC Leisure Centre in Bishops Castle. This is detailed in the second chart below.
