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
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## **Shropshire Libraries Needs Assessment: Introduction**

Shropshire Library Service serves a population of 329,300 (Mid-2023 Population estimates, ONS). Shropshire operates a network of twenty one static libraries, a prison library (Stoke Heath), digital and development services and three mobile libraries. Together these services provide access to libraries across the County.

- 6 Core Libraries in Market Towns run by Shropshire Counci: Shrewsbury, Oswestry, Bridgnorth, Ludlow, Market Drayton and Whitchurch.
- 7 local community libraries run by Shropshire Council: Gobowen, Church Stretton, Bayston Hill, Wem, Library at the Lantern, Pontesbury and Much Wenlock.
- 8 local market town community libraries run by local community groups: Albrighton, Bishop's Castle, Broseley, Craven Arms, Highley, Shifnal, Cleobury Mortimer and Ellesmere.
- 3 Mobile libraries run by Shropshire Council with 274 stops on a rota.
- Stoke Heath Prison Library operated under fully funded contract from His Majesty's Prisons.



Shropshire's library service cost Shropshire Council £2,769,210 in 2024/25, which is the equivalent of £8.41 per head of population.

This Needs Assessment aims to:

- Review the context in which the library service operates in terms of the socio-demographic characteristics of the population the libraries serve
- Assess the catchment areas for each static library and the profile of the customers that live there
- Review usage statistics for the library service and monitor trends over time
- Assess ease of access to the library service and drive-time analysis
- The cost of operating library services


#### **Context**

Shropshire is a large rural county in the centre of the country in the West Midlands, sharing a border with Wales to the west. Shropshire is the second largest inland local authority behind Wiltshire, covering 319,730 hectares.

It has a population of 329,300 (2023 ONS Mid-Year Estimates) and is sparsely populated, with just over one person per hectare (4.3 persons per hectare in England). 97.5% of Shropshire's land mass is rural – the 2.5% of land mass that is classified as urban accommodates approximately 43% of the population. Shropshire's population is spread across the entire county, with hardly any unpopulated land area. This means that the provision of services can be more challenging and more expensive than it is in more urban locations and that for much of the population, access to employment and services can be time-consuming and costly.

The map below shows the population density of Shropshire. While the county town of Shrewsbury and key market towns are more densely populated, many parts of Shropshire contain less than 0.5 persons per hectare.

**Map 2: Population Density** 



#### **Population**

Over the 10 years to 2023, Shropshire's population has grown by 21,100 people (+6.8%) to 329,300.


Chart 1: Population Change in Shropshire, 2013-2023

The population in Shropshire has risen at a comparable rate to population growth in England and the West Midlands at an average annual rate of 0.7% per annum.


Shropshire has an ageing population, with 26.2% of the total population aged 65 and above in 2023 compared with 18.7% as an average across England. Shropshire has a lower proportion of people aged below the age of 50 than England or the West Midlands (51.5% compared to 62.0% nationally and 61.9% regionally). The "mushroom" shape of the population pyramid on the following page illustrates the ageing structure of the population in Shropshire.

#### **Housing & Households**


There were 139,579 households in Shropshire at the time of the 2021 Census. This represents an increase of 9,905 households since 2011, which is the equivalent of 7.6% growth. Growth in the number of households has exceeded regional and national growth (+5.9% and +6.2% respectively) and has also slightly exceeded population growth due to an increase in the number of single person households.

The average household size in 2021 in England was 2.37 people, slightly smaller than the West Midlands regional average of 2.41 people. In Shropshire, the average household size is 2.26 people.

2.3% of the Shropshire population lives in a communal establishment rather than a household. This equates to 7,300 people.

29.7% of all households in Shropshire in 2021 were single person, which is the equivalent of 41,428 people living alone. This proportion has risen from 28.9% in 2011 and constitutes an increase of 3,888 more people living by themselves. The proportion of single person households is similar in England and the West Midlands.


Chart 4: Breakdown of Households by Household Composition, 2021

29% of all Shropshire households comprise residents aged 66 and above. This compares with 22.0% in England and 22.6% in the West Midlands. More than half of these households are single person.


Chart 5: Proportion of Households with all Residents 66+, 2021

Less than a quarter of households in Shropshire contain children. This compares with 28.5% in England and 29.4% in the West Midlands.

Chart 6: Households with Dependent Children, 2021



#### **Health & Disability**

More than four-fifths of the Shropshire population consider themselves to be in either good or very good health. The proportion is similar in the West Midlands and England. 5.1% consider themselves to be in either bad or very bad health. Again, this proportion is comparable to the national average (5.2%) and very slightly lower than the regional average (5.7%).

According to the 2021 Census, 18.5% of the Shropshire population is registered disabled under the Equality Act. This compares with 17.3% in England and 18.1% in the West Midlands. Of the disabled population, 40.5% (7.5% of the total population) say their day-to-day activities are limited a lot.

Over three-quarters of the population nationally and regionally are not disabled and do not have a long term physical or mental health condition. This proportion is slightly lower at 74.1% in Shropshire. 7.4% are not disabled but do have a long term physical or mental health condition compared with 6.8% in England and 6.5% in the West Midlands.



Rates of disability increase significantly with age, with 40% of the 75 plus population in Shropshire registered as disabled under the Equality Act.

Chart 8: Rates of Disability in Shropshire by Age, 2021



#### **Economic Activity and Employment**

58.4% of the 16+ population was economically active in 2021. This represents a decrease from 63.5% in 2011. Economic activity rates have also fallen in the West Midlands and England over the last decade. In 2021 the regional and national rates were very slightly superior to the Shropshire rate.


Chart 9: Economic Activity Rates, 2011 and 2021

The following chart shows the breakdown of the economically active population according to activity. The majority are in employment as an employee. However, the proportion that are self-employed is higher in Shropshire than in the West Midlands or England.

43.7% of Shropshire workers are employed in managerial, professional or associate professional occupations (SOC 1 -3). Although the proportion attributable to managers is slightly higher than it is in the West Midlands or England, the proportion attributable to professional occupations and associate professional occupations is marginally lower. Proportionally, there are fewer employed as process, plant and machine operatives or in elementary professions (SOC8-9) and more working in skilled trades and in caring and leisure occupations.

#### **Educational Attainment and Qualifications**

The average attainment 8 score in Shropshire in 2022/23 was 44.0. This compares with an average of 46.3 across all state funded schools in England. 38.2% of Shropshire students achieved a grade of 5 or above in English and mathematics compared with 45.3% of their national counterparts.

43% of the Shropshire population of traditional working age (16-64) are qualified to level RQF4 or above (about degree level). This is slightly higher than in the West Midlands, but lower than in England. Just over a tenth of the population have no qualifications or RQF1 level only.

#### **Deprivation**

#### **Overall Deprivation**

According to the English Indices of Multiple Deprivation (IMD) 2019, Shropshire is ranked as the 174<sup>th</sup> most deprived lower tier local authority in England out of 317. In comparison with 2015, Shropshire has become slightly more deprived in relation to other local authorities (185th out of 326 authorities).

In Shropshire, there are two lower-level super output areas (LSOAs) in the 10% most deprived areas of England – one in Harlescott electoral division and the other in Ludlow East. The former was also in the most deprived decile in 2015, while the latter moved from the 20% most deprived in 2015 to the 10% most deprived in 2019.

Approximately 5% of Shropshire's population live in the most deprived 20% of areas within England and 54% live within the least deprived 50% of areas.

The table below shows in which LSOAs individual libraries are located and to which national decile they belonged in 2015 and 2019. Decile 1 represents the most deprived and decile 10 the least deprived. This shows that Oswestry, Market Drayton and the Lantern libraries are in the most deprived areas and that Cleobury Mortimer, Ellesmere and Albrighton are in the least deprived. The LSOAs in which Bridgnorth, Shifnal and Bayston Hill are located have become relatively more deprived since 2015 with Shrewsbury and Cleobury Mortimer becoming relatively less deprived.


#### **Barriers to Housing & Services**

47 LSOAs in Shropshire fall within the top 10% most deprived LSOAs in England according to the Barriers to Housing and Services domain of the IMD. 35 are within the most deprived 5% and eight are within the 1% most deprived LSOAs nationally. More than a quarter of the Shropshire population live in the 47 LSOAs that are in the 10% most deprived areas in England, which means that they are more likely to struggle to access the services that they need.

#### **Active Library Users**

6.5% of all active users of Shropshire's libraries live in the 30% most deprived areas nationally, as shown in the chart following. 15.6% live in the least deprived 20% of England. The breakdown of library users according to their IMD decile is broadly in line with the breakdown of the Shropshire population, albeit slightly less deprived.

Chart 11: Overall IMD: Proportion of Active Library Users and Shropshire Population in each National Decile, 2019



#### **Car Ownership**

As a large rural county, car ownership can be a necessity rather than a privilege, and there are relatively few households that do not have access to a car or van at 13.8% in 2021. This represents a reduction from 15.8% in 2011. More than a fifth of households in both the West Midlands and England do not have access to a motor vehicle.

#### **Broadband Availability**

Over 99% of premises in Shropshire have access to superfast broadband (download speeds >30mbps), with the number edging upwards over the last two years. Coverage is marginally better in Shropshire than it is nationally (98.3% June 2025 according to Think Broadband). The remaining gaps tend to be in very rural hard-to-reach locations.

Gigabit broadband technology (speeds of >1,000mbps) has been rolled out rapidly in the UK over the last few years, with 87.6% of UK premises having access by June 2025. The roll-out in rural areas like Shropshire is much more difficult and consequently has been slower. However, 74.7% of Shropshire premises are now gigabit-capable.

## **Catchment Analysis**

A catchment has been identified for each library based on the area from which it derives the major share of its customers based on registered users' home postcodes. Across Shropshire, each output area<sup>2</sup> has been allocated to the library to which the highest proportion of its residents are registered to create discreet catchment areas. These are shown on Map 3 on page 13. To ensure that each catchment is a contiguous area, in a small minority of cases, an output area has been allocated to the most appropriate catchment even though a higher share of residents may use an alternative library. Naturally, some library users in all catchments use alternative library provision in other catchments. Please note that the designation of catchment areas is based on the 2024 database of users.

Many of Shropshire's libraries also attract users who live outside the local authority boundary. Non-Shropshire output areas have been included within in each library's catchment when there are at least nine active users for the main six libraries and at least four active library users for all other libraries. Using this methodology means that these wider catchments (shown on Map 4 on page 13) are not necessarily contiguous.

Shrewsbury is the largest catchment, accounting for 17% of Shropshire's land mass, ahead of Ludlow, Bridgnorth and Bishop's Castle. Oswestry is the third largest when considering cross border catchment. As well as Oswestry, a sizeable proportion of the Whitchurch and Ludlow catchments are outside Shropshire. The catchments for the Lantern, Gobowen, Highley and Bayston Hill are the smallest, together accounting for less than 1% of Shropshire hectares. The Lantern and Bayston Hill catchments are entirely subsumed within the Shrewsbury catchment, while Gobowen is completely enclosed within Oswestry. The smallest catchments tend to be close to an alternative larger library.




Shrewsbury is also the largest catchment in terms of population, accounting for just over 30% of the Shropshire population. Oswestry ranks second, taking a share of 12.3%. Bridgnorth, Market Drayton, Ludlow and Whitchurch make up the top six.


**Chart 13: Catchments ranked by Shropshire Population** 




Average population per hectare across Shropshire is just over one person. The chart below illustrates how this varies by library catchment. The smallest catchments - the Lantern, Gobowen, Highley and Bayston Hill are much more densely populated that many of the larger catchments. Population density is much lower than average for Bishop's Castle. Bridgnorth, Church Stretton, Cleobury Mortimer, Craven Arms, Ellesmere, Ludlow, Much Wenlock, Pontesbury and Wem.

More than 85% of Albrighton, Church Stretton, Ellesmere, Broseley, Bridgnorth and Shifnal active library users live in their library's designated catchment area. Not surprisingly, the smallest catchment areas tend to accommodate a lower proportion of the library's active users – less than 30% of users of the Lantern live within the Lantern's catchment. Likewise, around two-thirds of users or fewer of Bayston Hill, Gobowen and Craven Arms libraries live in their respective catchment areas. All these libraries are within relatively proximity of another library with a larger catchment area.

**Chart 15: Proportion of Active Users Living in Catchment Area** 



All library catchments contain residents who are active users of an alternative library. The highest number is in the Shrewsbury catchment, where there are 1,670 users of other libraries across Shropshire. 481 users of the Lantern live in the Shrewsbury catchment area (61.7% of all Lantern users) as well as 246 Bayston Hill Library users (29.9% of all Bayston Hill library users). 438 people living in the Oswestry catchment area use alternative libraries – of these, 159 use Shrewsbury library and 63 use Gobowen. A quarter of Gobowen library users live in the Oswestry catchment.

Comparatively few users of alternative libraries live in the Cleobury Mortimer, Albrighton, Highley, Broseley or Shifnal catchments.

It should be noted that users of mobile libraries are included within these up-dated 2025 figures (having been excluded in 2024). This means that the proportion of library users living in their designated catchment area has declined slightly for most libraries and that the number using alternative library provision had increased.

**Chart 16: Number of Users Living in each Catchment Using Alternative Libraries** 




### **Library Catchments Average IMD Score**

Average IMD scores have been calculated for each Shropshire library catchment (see map 5 on page 16 for catchment areas). This shows that Bayston Hill and Albrighton are the least deprived and that the Lantern and Bishop's Castle are the most deprived.

## **Shropshire Libraries: Demand and Usage Analysis**

Library usage data provides a good indication of how much libraries are used by the population and the level of demand that exists across a range of different activities. Analysing trend data over time gives insights into changing demand and patterns of usage also incorporating the evolving digital offer.

This data can show clear variations between different libraries - libraries across Shropshire have different offers, strengths, environments, buildings, catchments, socio-economic characteristics, local communities and so on. It is also useful to compare these trends with the national picture. This data is sourced from Shropshire Council Library Systems.

#### **Library Demand Trend Analysis**

The analysis below shows trends in library usage over the last five years. During this period, the Covid-19 Pandemic took place when libraries were closed for periods of time in national lockdowns. As to be expected, this caused a decline in demand and activity, but it is interesting to see how demand changed after this timeframe and how trends in digitalisation and e-books has evolved. The time frame under review (2019/20 to 2024/25) has also been a period of change in consumer expectations, unprecedented rises in the cost of living and more financially challenging budgets for local authorities.

The library usage data below shows library activity trends overtime, from April to March 2019/20to April to March 2024/25. It excludes mobile libraries and headquarters.

Library usage dipped hugely during the Covid-19 Pandemic in 2020/21 but the number of people using libraries for different activities has steadily increased year on year since 2021. Whilst numbers are lower than pre-pandemic levels, there is a year-on-year recovery in numbers and growth since 2020/21. However, between 2023/24 and 2024/25 numbers have begun to plateau or slightly fall in some areas.

The number of active library users (Chart 17) has fallen from 40,100 in 2019/20 to 33,362 in 2024/25. This is a decline of 17.0%. All libraries experienced a huge decline in usage during the Covid-19 Pandemic. There has been a good steady recovery in the number of active users since 2020/21 but levels have not yet reached pre-pandemic levels. Despite this, however, there has been year on year growth in active library users to 82% of pre-pandemic levels (2018/19) in 2024/25. This trend has slightly changed in the last year as between 2023/24 and 24/25 the number of active users has fallen slightly from 34,643 to 33,362, a 3.7% fall. In four Shropshire libraries the number of active users has recovered to pre-pandemic levels; these are Pontesbury, Much Wenlock, Brosely and Bayston Hill.

The number of visits (Chart 18) has declined from 827,342 in 2019/20 to 640,560 in 2024/25, a decline of 22.6%. This is greater than the decline in the number of active users, suggesting users are visiting less often. The number of visits in 2024/25 was 74% of the pre-pandemic levels of 2018/19. All libraries have seen a decline in visits over the 5-year period, although there is a steady year on year increase since the Covid-19 Pandemic in 2020/21, as the number of visits continues to grow. Some libraries had a particularly strong percentage increase in visits between 2022/3 to 2024/5 these were Bridgnorth (25% increase), Oswestry (31%), Albrighton (45%), Gobowen (76%) Highley (29%) Cleobury Mortimer (24%) and Broseley (24%).

The number of E-loans has continued to increase, although down since the Covid-19 Pandemic peak, e-loans have steadily risen from 68,104 in 2019/20 to 79,514 in 2024/25, a rise of 17%. E-loans now represent 12% of total loans compared to 6% in 2018/19. The increase in e-loans has had a small impact on physical loans; physical loans were 88% of total loans in 2024/25 compared to 89.5% in 2019/20 and 94.1% in 2018/19. The number of physical loans has decreased by 18% since 2019/20, but numbers have been increasing steadily, year on year since 2020/21, however the number of physical loans slightly fell from 592,057 in 2023/24 to 563,510 in 2024/25. The number of total loans slightly fell from 756,222 in 2019/20 to 643,024 in 2024/25; this suggests while active users and visits are increasing people are borrowing fewer items on each visit.

Public computer usage has been slower to recover to pre pandemic levels compared to other activities. In 2019/20 computer use in hours was 51,857.97; in 2023/24 this has fallen by over half to 21,158.5 hours. However there has been a steady increase year on year since 2020/21.

Event attendance has recovered well since the Pandemic and has been growing fast since 2021 at a greater level than traditional library activities. Attendance in 2019/20 was 48,666 this has risen to 77,621 or by 59.5% and continues to grow year on year. During the last 12 months event attendance has risen by 15.3%. This supports the increasing role libraries have as community hubs.




Chart 17: Number of Active Library Users 2019/20 to 2024/25 (Year-end March, Static Libraries)

Active Users (borrowers) are registered library users (registered at a certain branch) who have actively used the library in the last 12 months.




Chart 18: Number of Visits to Static Libraries 2019/20 to 2024/25

Chart 19: Number of Loans Static Libraries 2019/20 to 2024/25





Chart 20: Number of Physical Issues Static Libraries 2019/20 to 2024/25

E-mags/newspapers aren't 'issued' in the same way, they're just available to view. In 2024/25 there were 2,107 unique users using the libraries for reading newspapers or magazines and 232,871 sessions. The number of unique users has risen from 316 in 2018/19 to 2,107 in 2024/25. The number of unique users has had a rising trend since 2018/19 rising by 1,791 between 2018/19 and 2024/25 a more than 5-fold increase.

Chart 22 Newspapers and Magazine Readers 2018/19 to 2024/25





Chart 23: Number of E-Loans as a Percentage of Total Loans Static Libraries 2019/20 to 2024/25

Chart 24: Public Computer Use Time in Hours Static Libraries 2019/20 to 2024/25




Chart 25: Event Attendance Static Libraries 2019/20 to 2024/25





#### **Mobile Libraries**

There are three mobile libraries run by Shropshire Council covering 237 stops ranging from 10 minutes to 2.5 hours on a fortnightly rota. Map of routes. The number of active borrowers was 1,132 in 2024/25. See appendix for list of mobile library stops.

The number of active library users (Chart 26) for mobile libraries has declined from 1,458 in 2019/20 to 1,132 in 2024/25. This is a decline of -326 (-22.4%). Numbers declined during the Covid-19 Pandemic in 2020/21 but have slowly recovered in subsequent years. The number of users of mobile libraries has not yet recovered to pre-pandemic levels and in 2023/24 the number of users was 77.6% of the number in 2019/20. The last threeyear trend, whilst increasing, has begun to plateau.

The number of visits to mobile libraries (Chart 27) shows a decline from 23,400 in 2019/20 to 23,052 in 2024/25, a decline of -348 (-1.5%). The number of visits has not yet recovered to pre-pandemic levels however in 2024/25 the number of visits were 98% of 2018/19 levels. In the three years since the Covid-19 Pandemic the number of visits has shown a year-on-year significant rise.

In terms of the number of loans (Chart 28) there has been a decline of 2,661 (-16%) from 58,810 in 2019/20 to 56,149 in 2024/25. The number of loans has not yet recovered to pre-pandemic levels and in 2023/24 loans were 95% of 2019/20 levels. There has been a significant recovery in the number of loans since the Covid-19 Pandemic with 2021/22 figures showing a particularly high of 60,298, more recently, in the last year there is a significant increase in the number of loans from 49,349 in 2023/24 to 56,149 in 2024/258.

Chart 27: Number of Active Library Users 2019/20 to 2024/25 (Year-end April, Mobile Libraries)




Chart 28: Number of Visits to Mobile Libraries 2018/19 to 2023/24 (Year-end April, Mobile Libraries)





Chart 29: Number of Loans Mobile Libraries 2018/19 to 2023/24 (Year-end April, Mobile Libraries)



## **Profile of Shropshire Library Users**

## **Age and Gender**

The Shropshire library user base is primarily female, with women accounting for 65% of all users. In comparison, just over half (50.7%) of the Shropshire population is female (ONS Mid-Year estimates, 2023). The age profile of library users is also slightly different to the base population, with a much higher representation of children and young adults. People under the age of 20 account for 27.2% of library users but represent less than a fifth of the Shropshire population. The use of libraries by younger people demonstrates libraries do still have an appeal to the younger population, which perhaps contradicts the perception of library users as being predominantly older. The proportion attributable to over 65's is aligned to the Shropshire population (28.2% of library users against 26.2% of the population). Consequently, the 20-64 age band is under-represented, accounting for 44.5% of library users (53.9% of the Shropshire population).




Chart 31: Library Users as Proportion of Population by Age

#### **Concessionary Users**

Just over 3,000 active users of the Shropshire library service have concessionary membership. This equates with 8.7% of all library users. Concessionary membership can be usefully used as a proxy for members who have a disability. According to the 2021 Census, 59,990 Shropshire residents are registered as disabled under the terms of the Equality Act. This translates into a user rate of 5% of the disabled population and suggests that the cohort is under-represented given an overall user rate across the population of over 10%. However, it should be noted that users with a disability may use the library services under standard membership.

## **Access to Library Services**

Shropshire's 21 static libraries (excluding Stoke Heath) are spread across the county, with at least one per place plan area<sup>3</sup>. This means that most people are within relatively straightforward access by car of at least one library.

More than three-quarters of Shropshire's population (77%) live within a 10-minute drive of at least one library. Currently, just 1% of the population have to travel further than 25 minutes by car to access library services.

Access to the main six libraries is also achievable for most people within 25 minutes' drive, although 9% of the population (28,777 people) live outside this catchment. 21% live outside a 20-minute drive of a main library, which is the equivalent of 66,971 people. Just over half of the population live within a 10-minute car journey of one of the main six libraries.

The following table shows the proportion of active library users for each library which lives within certain walk and drive times.

Across all library users, almost a third live within a 15-minute walk of the library for which they are registered. This proportion rises to over half if the length of the walk is doubled to half an hour. Libraries where a particularly high proportion of users live very locally include Albrighton, Bayston Hill, Broseley, Cleobury Mortimer, Gobowen, Highley and Shifnal. In contrast, users of the main six libraries are much less likely to live within a 15-minute walk which reflects the much larger catchments that these libraries represent.

93.7% of all library users live within a 25-minute drive of the library that they use. This proportion exceeds 90% in all libraries except Ludlow which attracts relatively high numbers of users from its rural hinterland and from across the border in Herefordshire. Given that 99% of the Shropshire population live within a 25-minute drive of their closest library (see Table 10 above), it is clear that some library users are not registered with their closest facility.






Currently, 98% of library users live within a 25-minute drive of their closest library (which is not necessarily the library to which they are registered). Almost three-quarters live within a 10-minute drive. The time required to travel to one of the main libraries is much longer. 48% of current users (of all libraries) need to travel for more than 10 minutes to access one of the main libraries while one in ten lives more than a 25-minute drive away.

# **Shropshire Library Costs**

Chart 32 shows annual running costs attributable to Shropshire Council per library; the larger libraries had larger annual costs. Shrewsbury Library had the highest costs at £500,530 followed by Ludlow and Oswestry. The lowest costs were Craven Arms, Shifnal and Broseley. The total cost for all static libraries was £2,573,850. The average cost was £116,993.18. Annual running costs are influenced by the size of the library and often the building it is located in as well as the role Shropshire Council plays in its operation.

Chart 32: Annual Costs per Library 2024/25 (Annual Budget)



Chart 33: Cost Per Opening Hour 2024/25





Chart 35: Cost per Book Loan 2024/25



Chart 36: Cost Per Individual Walk in Footfall 2024/25



Whitchurch Library was the most expensive library ranked 22 with the highest overall score, followed by Ludlow, Oswestry and Gobowen. Chart 38 – Users by Running Cost Main Libraries



There are three mobile libraries run by Shropshire Council covering 237 stops ranging from 10 minutes to 2.5 hours on a fortnightly rota. Map of routes. The number of active borrowers was 1,132 in 2024/25.

The cost to run mobile libraries is relatively high compared to the average for all static libraries. It is also relatively high in relation to the number of active borrowers. The cost of running three mobile libraries is similar to the cost of running a library in one of the large market towns.

However, the mobile libraries do provide a valuable service to rural communities and for people who find accessing static libraries more difficult.


The mobile libraries are open for 46.75 hours per week and 2,431 hours per annum. However additional time and costs are involved in drive times and vehicle maintenance.



Chart 40: Library Count (2016) for Shropshire & Shropshire CIPFA Nearest Neighbours







# **Background**


- Albrighton is a large village in the east of Shropshire, approximately two miles from the border with Wolverhampton.
- The library is located in the centre of the village, less than 10 minutes' walk from the railway station, which is on the Shrewsbury to Wolverhampton route.
- It is a single storey building, owned by Shropshire Council and leased to Albrighton Parish Council.
- The library catchment covers an area of approximately 6,100 hectares within Shropshire about 2% of the county's land mass. As shown in the map opposite, the catchment also crosses the border with Wolverhampton.
- The total population within the Albrighton library catchment area is 9,000 comprising 3,196 households.
- 432 people in the catchment live outside Shropshire (4.8%).



# **Library Users**

- Albrighton library had 786 active users in the 2024/25 financial year. This is the equivalent of 2.4% of all Shropshire library users (excluding mobile library users and Stoke Heath).
- 8.1% of the Albrighton catchment population are active library users (all Shropshire libraries).
- Around two-thirds of users are female (2023/24 financial year).
- The age breakdown of users (2024/25) is shown in the adjacent chart.
- Compared with the Shropshire profile of library users, there are slightly fewer children and young adults and a higher proportion of people aged 50 and above.


# **Albrighton: Number of Active Users**




# **Albrighton: Number of Visits**



### **Breakdown of Albrighton Library Users by Age**



- As in all locations, the number of users fell significantly during the pandemic – subsequently, there has been considerable recovery each year, although numbers have yet to recover to pre-pandemic. The rate of recovery has slowed over the last year.
- The decline in users between 2019/20 and 2024/25 is 118 users (-13.1%) which is slightly lower than the average decline across all 21 Shropshire libraries (-16.9%).
- The number of visits in 2024/25 stood at 13,765, which is the equivalent of about 18 visits on average per active user.
- Footfall plummeted in 2020/21 when libraries were mostly closed for business and although recovery has occurred in the 2021/22-2024/25 period, each library user is still making fewer visits than they used to (20 visits per user in 2019/20).
- The overall number of visits was 23.6% lower in 2024/25 than in 2019/20.
- 12,475 loans were made in 2024/25, which equates with 16 per active user and just under 1 per visit.
- The number of loans declined by 4% between 2023/24 and 2024/25.
- The number of requests received by the library also fell by 8% and computer time used was down by 21%.

### **Geographic Location of Library Users**

- Almost 90% of all Albrighton library users live within the main catchment area, with concentrations of users in the main town centre area.
- Nearly two-thirds of users live within Albrighton parish.
- 7.7% of the population in the catchment area are Albrighton active library users. The percentage of the population using the library according to each output area in the catchment ranges from less than 2% to almost 20%. Please note that this only includes users with a complete and accurate home postcode.
- Of the 10% of Albrighton library users that do not live in the catchment, about 4% live within the adjoining catchments of Shifnal and Bridgnorth (about 2% in each case).
- Small numbers of people that live in the Albrighton catchment are registered with an alternative library – most usually Shifnal (19 people) or Bridgnorth (20 people).
- Over the six months to March 2025, 92.8% of all visits to libraries made by users registered with Albrighton library were to Albrighton, and these accounted for 93.3% of all issues.
- Other libraries visited by users registered to Albrighton include Shrewsbury, Shifnal, Much Wenlock and Bridgnorth.



#### **Access to Alternative Libraries**

- The road and rail infrastructure that serves Albrighton means that it is easier to travel eastwards and westwards rather than north to south. This means that the only Shropshire library that is accessible within a 10-to-15minute drive is Shifnal. Several libraries located outside of Shropshire are also more readily accessibly than alternative Shropshire provision including Wolverhampton, Newport and Telford.
- Shifnal library is 5.6 miles from Albrighton library. Bridgnorth is the closest main Shropshire library (11.2 miles away). According to the AA route planner, drive time between the two libraries is 22 minutes.
- Albrighton is on the Shrewsbury to Wolverhampton train line. This means that is relatively straightforward to travel between Albrighton and Shifnal, and that it is easier to access Shrewsbury library than Bridgnorth using public transport. The former can be reached by train in 50 minutes via an hourly service at peak times. Access to Bridgnorth library by public transport requires taking a train to Shifnal and then the 114 bus to Bridgnorth.

- Albrighton is the fourth least expensive library in Shropshire to operate (for Shropshire Council) behind Craven Arms, Shifnal and Broseley.
- The annual cost to Shropshire Council is £9,490 (2024/25)
- Albrighton library costs less than average per hour open, per active user, per visit and per book loan.



### Breakdown of Albrighton Library Users by IMD Decile






### **Albrighton: Occupation Types**





### Unemployment




- Bayston Hill is a large village in the centre of Shropshire, approximately three miles south of Shrewsbury town centre.
- The library is located in the centre of the village and is within close proximity of the A49 which gives access to Shrewsbury to the north and Church Stretton to the south.
- The library building is owned by Shropshire Council and library services are likewise operated by Shropshire Council.
- The library catchment covers an area of approximately 864 hectares about 0.3% of the county's land mass. This makes the catchment one of the smallest in Shropshire. The catchment area is identical to Bayston Hill parish council.
- The total population within the Bayston Hill library catchment area is 5,221 comprising 2,208 households.
- The total catchment is within Shropshire and is entirely subsumed within the Shrewsbury catchment.









### **Bayston Hill: Number of Visits**

This includes only library users with a complete and accurate home postcode.










### **Bayston Hill: Occupation Types**












- Bishop's Castle is a small town in the rural south west of Shropshire, approximately two miles from the Welsh border.
- The library is located in the centre of the town in the Enterprise House building which also has general office space and printing and photocopying facilities.
- The library building is owned by Shropshire Council but leased to Enterprise South West.
- The library catchment covers an area of approximately 30,544 hectares within Shropshire which is about 9.6% of the county's land mass. This makes the catchment one of the largest in Shropshire. 15% of the catchment area is in Wales as shown on the adjacent map.
- The total population within the Bishop's Castle library catchment area is 7,617 comprising 3,420 households. The Shropshire population (5,877 people) accounts for 77.2% of the total catchment population. The catchment is the most sparsely populated, with just 0.19 people per hectare.










### Breakdown of Bishop's Castle Library Users by Age



- As in all locations, the number of users fell significantly during the pandemic – subsequently, there has been considerable recovery although this now appears to have plateaued, and numbers remains well below pre-pandemic levels.
- The decrease in users between 2019/20 and 2024/25 is 186 users (-19.8%). This compares with an average decline in users of 16.9% across all 21 Shropshire libraries.
- The number of visits in 2024/25 stood at 17,007, which is the equivalent of about 23 visits on average per active user.
- Footfall plummeted in 2020/21 when libraries were mostly closed for business but the frequency with which users visit the library, at almost once a fortnight on average, has gone back up to pre-pandemic levels.

- 76.5% of all Bishop's Castle library users live within the main catchment area.
- 38.2% live within Bishop's Castle Parish.
- 8.0% of the population in the catchment area are Bishop's Castle active library users. The percentage of the population using the library according to each output area in the catchment ranges from less than 2% to around a quarter.
- Of the 23.5% of Bishop's Castle library users that do not live in the catchment, most live in either Church Stretton, Craven Arms, Ludlow, Shrewsbury or Pontesbury catchments.
- People that live in the Bishop's Castle catchment but use a different library are most likely to use Church Stretton, Craven Arms, Ludlow, Shrewsbury or Pontesbury libraries.



#### **Access to Alternative Libraries**

- Bishop's Castle is in the south west of Shropshire close to the Welsh border. It is in a very rural location and serves a substantial very sparsely populated hinterland.
- The closest library to Bishop's Castle library is in Craven Arms, which is located 11.1 miles away. According to the AA route planner, drive time between the two libraries is 22 minutes.
- The nearest of the main six libraries is Ludlow, which is approximately 18 miles away with a drive time of 31 minutes. Shrewsbury is slightly further afield at 22 miles, or a 41-minute drive.
- Bishop's Castle is not on the rail network. However, there is a bus service to Shrewsbury town centre which takes about an hour.
- Accessing Ludlow via public transport is more challenging. A direct bus service is infrequent.



# Age Breakdown of Bishop's Castle Catchment






### **Bishop's Castle: Occupation Types**





### % of Population with No or Low Qualifications










- Bridgnorth is a town in the south east of Shropshire on the River Severn. It is approximately 7 miles from the Shropshire border and 14 miles from Wolverhampton.
- The library is a single storey building located in the centre of the town, with parking to the rear. The building is owned by Shropshire Council.
- The library catchment covers an area of approximately 34,243 hectares within Shropshire which is about 10.7% of the county's land mass. This makes the catchment one of the largest in Shropshire. The catchment is contained within Shropshire.
- The total population within the Bridgnorth library catchment area is 25,493 comprising 11,025 households. In terms of the population it serves, Bridgnorth is the third largest catchment in Shropshire.






# **Bridgnorth: Number of Active Users**




# **Bridgnorth: Number of Visits**










#### **Bridgnorth: Occupation Types**











- The library is located in the centre of the town with an adjacent car park.
- The library building is late 19<sup>th</sup> century and is a converted school house. Library services are commissioned by Shropshire Council and run by the town council.
- The library catchment covers an area of approximately 3,272 hectares within Shropshire which is about 1% of the county's land mass. This makes the catchment one of the smallest in Shropshire. A small proportion of the catchment is outside Shropshire in Telford and Wrekin (the equivalent of 67 hectares).
- The total population within the Broseley library catchment area is 6,287 comprising 2,737 households. The Shropshire population (5,981 people) accounts for 95.1% of the total catchment population.




## **Broseley: Number of Active Users**




#### **Broseley: Number of Visits**





## Breakdown of Broseley Library Users by IMD Decile






#### **Broseley: Occupation Types**





#### % of Population with No or Low Qualifications








- Church Stretton is a small town in the south of Shropshire, located on the A49 between Shrewsbury and Ludlow. It is located within the Shropshire Hills Area of **Outstanding Natural Beauty.**
- The library is the centre of the town on Church Street with a small car park to the rear.
- The library building, owned by Shropshire Council, is mid-19<sup>th</sup> century and is a converted schoolhouse. The building also houses the town's Visitor Information Centre.
- The library catchment covers an area of approximately 17,740 hectares within Shropshire which is about 5.5% of the county's land mass. The catchment, which is entirely within Shropshire, accounts for the seventh largest share of Shropshire hectares, and other than Bishop's Castle is the largest catchment outside of the six main libraries.
- The total population within the Church Stretton library catchment area is 7,963 comprising 3,691 households.






#### **Church Stretton: Number of Active Users**




#### **Church Stretton: Number of Visits**

- As in all locations, the number of users fell significantly during the pandemic – subsequently, there has been some recovery although numbers dipped again in 2023/24 before picking up again in 2024/25.
- The decrease in users between 2019/20 and 2024/25 is 226 users (-15.6%). This compares with an average decline in users of 16.0% across all 21 Shropshire libraries.
- The number of visits in 2023/24 stood at 34,976, which is the equivalent of about 29 visits on average per active user.



#### **Access to Alternative Libraries**

- Church Stretton is in the south of Shropshire on the A49 between Shrewsbury and Ludlow.
- It benefits from a train station which is on the Shrewsbury to Cardiff line.
- The closest library to Church Stretton library is Craven Arms, which is located 7.8 miles away. According to the AA route planner, drive time between the two libraries is 13 minutes. There is also a relatively frequent train service and a regular bus service.
- The nearest of the main six libraries is Ludlow which is approximately 15.5 miles away with a drive time of 25 minutes.
- Ludlow is easily accessible from the centre of Church Stretton via train or bus.








## **Church Stretton: Occupation Types**










### **Cleobury Mortimer: Number of Active Users**












### **Cleobury Mortimer: Occupation Types**








#### Craven Arms: Number of Active Users




#### **Craven Arms: Number of Visits**



- Craven Arms has a railway station and is on the Shrewsbury to Cardiff line.
- The closest library to Craven Arms library is Ludlow, which is located 7.9 miles away. According to the AA route planner, drive time between the two libraries is 13 minutes.
- Ludlow is easily accessible from the centre of Craven Arms by the 435 bus, which runs frequently with a journey time of about 20 minutes. Alternatively, Craven Arms is just one stop from Ludlow by train.






#### **Craven Arms: Occupation Types**





#### % of Population with No or Low Qualifications








- Ellesmere is a small town in the north of Shropshire, located on the A495 between Oswestry to the west and Whitchurch to the east.
- The library is located in the centre of Ellesmere in the Our Space building on Trimpley Street.
- The library is run by Bethphage on behalf of Shropshire Council. Bethphage is a charity providing specialist support to adults with learning difficulties.
- The library catchment covers an area of approximately 12,841 hectares which is about 4% of the county's land mass. The catchment also extends north of the border into Wrexham. 6% of Ellesmere's catchment is outside Shropshire.
- The total population within the Ellesmere library catchment area is 9,823 comprising 4,255 households. The Shropshire population is 8,911.





## **Ellesmere: Number of Active Users**













#### % of Population with No or Low Qualifications








## **Gobowen: Number of Active Users**

































**Highley: Economic Activity Rate** 











- As in all locations, the number of users fell significantly during the pandemic – subsequently, there has been some recovery year-on-year. However, numbers are still down compared with the pre-pandemic period.
- The decrease in users between 2019/20 and 2024/25 is 333 users (-29.9%). This compares with an average decline in users of 16.9% across all 21 Shropshire libraries.
- The number of visits in 2024/25 stood at 15,288, which is the equivalent of about 20 visits on average per active user.





## Breakdown of Library at the Lantern Users by IMD Decile






### **Lantern: Occupation Types**





#### % of Population with No or Low Qualifications



















- Market Drayton library had 2,466 active users in the 2024/25 financial year. This is the equivalent of 7.6% of all Shropshire library users (excluding mobile library users and Stoke Heath).
- 8.8% of the Market Drayton catchment population are active library users, which is lower than the Shropshire average. This includes usage of all Shropshire libraries, not just Market Drayton.
- Just under two-thirds of users are female (2023/24 financial year).
- The age breakdown of users (2024/25) is shown in the adjacent chart.
- Compared with the Shropshire profile of library users, there are more children and young people and fewer users aged 50 and above.






# **Breakdown of Market Drayton Library Users by Age**



- As in all locations, the number of users fell significantly during the pandemic – subsequently, there has been considerable recovery each year until 2024.25, when the number of users reduced by 295. User numbers have yet to recover to pre-pandemic levels.
- The decrease in users between 2019/20 and 2024/25 is 395 users (-13.8%). This compares with an average decline in users of 16.9% across all 21 Shropshire libraries.
- The number of visits in 2024/25 stood at 55,330, which is the equivalent of about 22 visits on average per active user.



#### Access

- Market Drayton is in the northeast of Shropshire close to the border with Staffordshire.
- Whitchurch is the closest alternative library, located approximately 12.7 miles west of Market Drayton via the A53 and A41. According to the AA route planner, the journey time between the two libraries is 24 minutes.
- Two out-of-county libraries are also within a 25 minute drive time - Nantwich to the north in Cheshire and Newport in Telford & Wrekin.



### Costs

- Market Drayton is the fifth most expensive library in Shropshire to operate (for Shropshire Council) behind Shrewsbury, Ludlow, Oswestry and Bridgnorth.
- Annual running costs are £195,410 (2024/25).









#### % of Population with No or Low Qualifications




## Unemployment






- Much Wenlock is located south east of Shrewsbury, between the county town and Bridgnorth.
- The library is located on the ground floor of the imposing Grade II listed Corn Exchange in the centre of the town. The building is owned by Much Wenlock Town Council. Parking is available to the rear.
- The library catchment covers an area of approximately 10,051 hectares which is approximately 3.1% of the county's land mass. The catchment extends very slightly out of Shropshire into Telford & Wrekin.
- The total population within the Much Wenlock library catchment area is 5,345 comprising 2,294 households. 92.4% of the population live in Shropshire – the equivalent of 4,938 people.






#### **Much Wenlock: Number of Active Users**




#### **Much Wenlock: Number of Visits**

- As in all locations, the number of users fell significantly during the pandemic - subsequently, there has been recovery year-on-year and numbers are now higher than they were pre-pandemic.
- The increase in users between 2019/20 and 2024/25 is 66 users (+15.3%). This compares with an average decline in users of 16.9% across all 21 Shropshire libraries.



- The nearest main library is Bridgnorth, which is 8.1 miles or a 14-minute drive away. The 436 bus service takes approximately 35 minutes between the destinations.








#### **Much Wenlock: Occupation Types**










# **Background**

- Oswestry is a town in the north west of Shropshire close to the Welsh border. It is the second largest settlement in the county behind Shrewsbury.
- Oswestry is a large public library situated within a four storey multioccupancy complex with council offices, Wilkinson's, and several independent organisations. The original building dates from early 1900s but the library was refurbished in 2007 and now occupies two accessible open plan floors with lift access.
- The library is in the centre of town with public parking nearby. The library is owned and operated by Shropshire Council.
- The library catchment covers an area of approximately 26,072 hectares within Shropshire which is about 8.2% of the county's land mass. This makes the catchment one of the largest in Shropshire. The catchment also extends outside of the Shropshire border into Wales – in fact 36% of the total catchment is not in Shropshire as shown on the adjacent map, reflecting Oswestry's importance as a service centre for much of rural mid-Wales.
- The total population within the Oswestry library catchment area is 45,063 comprising 19,446 households. 89% of the catchment population – 39,935 peopleare Shropshire residents. In terms of the Shropshire population it serves, Oswestry is the second largest catchment in Shropshire.




# **Oswestry: Number of Active Users**




# **Oswestry: Number of Visits**

















- The library is located in a purpose-built modern one storey building which was constructed in 2019. The building is shared with the local police. Library services are operated by Shropshire Council.
- The library catchment covers an area of approximately 8,253 hectares which is approximately 2.6% of the county's land mass. The catchment is entirely contained within Shropshire although it does extend to the border with Wales.
- The total population within the Pontesbury library catchment area is 6,460 comprising 2,819 households.






# **Pontesbury: Number of Active Users**




# **Pontesbury: Number of Visits**

- As in all locations, the number of users fell significantly during the pandemic – subsequently, there has been recovery year-on-year and numbers are now higher than they were pre-pandemic.






#### **Pontesbury: Occupation Types**



















**Shifnal: Number of Visits**









#### % of Population with No or Low Qualifications





It has several meeting rooms, a staff room, public toilets and is owned and operated by Shropshire Council.
- The library catchment covers an area of approximately 54,507 hectares within Shropshire which is about 17% of the county's land mass. This makes the catchment the largest in Shropshire. The catchment also extends slightly outside Shropshire, although 99% is within the county boundary.

In terms of the Shropshire population it serves, Shrewsbury is twice the size of the second largest catchment (Oswestry).








# Breakdown of Shrewsbury Library Users by IMD Decile

- Shrewsbury library is in decile six according to the 2019 IMD, which means that it is within the 40% least deprived areas of the country.
- There is a stronger bias towards users living in less deprived areas, with 26.9% living in the least deprived 20% of the country (15.6% for all library users).
- Less than 5% of users are drawn from the most deprived 30% of England.


#### **Economic Activity**

- The level of economic activity amongst the 16+ population in the Shrewsbury library catchment is higher than the Shropshire average at 60.4% at the time of the 2021 Census.
- However, it is marginally lower than the England rate of 60.9%. Shropshire's older demographic means that more people are retired, and fewer people participate in the labour market.
- The economic activity rate in the Shrewsbury library catchment area is the fourth highest in Shropshire after Shifnal, the Lantern and Albrighton.

### **Employment**

- 48,185 people in Shrewsbury were in employment in 2021, which equates with 58.0% of the 16+ population.
- A higher proportion of people are employed in managerial, professional and associate professional occupations (SOC 1-3) compared with Shropshire, at 46.7%. Fewer are employed in SOC4-7 occupations (skilled trades and services) and in SOC 8-9 occupations (process and plant operatives and elementary occupations).


# **Shrewsbury: Occupation Types**





#### % of Population with No or Low Qualifications







# **Background**


- Wem is located in the north of Shropshire between Shrewsbury and Whitchurch.
- The library occupies the ground floor of a building on Wem High Street close to the town car park.
- The building is leased to Shropshire Council which manages the library.
- The library catchment covers an area of approximately 13,958 hectares which is approximately 4.4% of the county's land mass. The catchment extends into Wrexham to the north.
- The total population within the Wem library catchment area is 11,948 comprising 5,117 households. 96.8% of the catchment population (11,564 people) are Shropshire residents.

#### **Opening Hours**

The library is open 20.5 hours a week (as of March 2025) according to the following schedule:






# **Library Users**

- Wem library had 1,166 active users in the 2024/25 financial year. This is the equivalent of 3.6% of all Shropshire library users (excluding mobile library users and Stoke Heath).
- 9.9% of the Wem catchment population are active library users, which is about the same as the Shropshire average. This includes users of all Shropshire libraries, nit just Wem.
- Over two-thirds of users are female (2023/24 financial year).
- The age breakdown of users (2024/25) is shown in the adjacent chart.
- Compared with the Shropshire profile of library users, there are more children and young adults and fewer users over the age of 50.






#### **Breakdown of Wem Library Users by Age**



- As in all locations, the number of users fell significantly during the pandemic – subsequently, there has been recovery year-on-year although numbers remain lower than they were pre-pandemic.
- The decrease in users between 2019/20 and 2024/25 is 92 users (-7.3%). This compares with an average decline in users of 16.9% across all 21 Shropshire libraries.
- The number of visits in 2024/25 stood at 42,033, which is the equivalent of about 36 visits on average per active user.
- Footfall plummeted in 2020/21 when libraries were mostly closed for business but the frequency with which users visit has gone back up to the level seen pre-pandemic (36 visits per user in 2019/20).
- The overall number of visits was 7.0% lower in 2024/25 than in 2019/20.
- 24,361 loans were made in 2024/25, which equates with 21 per active user and 0.6 per visit.
- The number of loans declined by 1% between 2023/24 and 2024/25.
- The number of requests received by the library fell by 10%.
- There was no change in the level of computer usage.

### **Geographic Location of Library Users**

- 79.4% of all Wem library users live within the main catchment area. This proportion is similar to the average for Shropshire.
- 52.8% of users live within Wem urban parish boundary with an additional 10.4% in Wem Rural.
- 7.5% of the population in the catchment area are Wem active library users. The percentage of the population using the library according to each output area in the catchment ranges from 1% to 15.7%. Please note that this includes only library users with an accurate and complete postcode.
- Of the 20.6% of Wem library users that do not live in the catchment, the majority live in the Whitchurch or Shrewsbury catchments.
- People that live in the Wem catchment but use a different Shropshire library are most likely to use Shrewsbury library.
- Over the six months to March 2025, 85.6% of all visits to libraries made by users registered with Wem library were to Wem library, and these accounted for 86.0% of all issues.
- Shrewsbury was the most frequently visited alternative library.



#### **Access to Alternative Libraries**

- Wem is in the north of Shropshire between Shrewsbury and Whitchurch. Proximity to the A49 means that both Shrewsbury and Whitchurch are easily accessible by car.
- Wem is on the mainline rail network on the Shrewsbury to Manchester route, so Shrewsbury and Whitchurch can also be accessed using public transport.
- The closest library to the Wem is Whitchurch, which is located 9 miles away. According to the AA route planner, drive time between the two libraries is 18 minutes.

#### Costs

- Wem ranks as the 8th most expensive library in Shropshire to operate (for Shropshire Council) and the second most expensive excluding the main six.
- Annual running costs are £110,670 (2024/25).
- The library has below average costs per visit, but above average costs per hour open, per user and per book loan.


#### Age Breakdown of Wem Catchment



**Wem: Occupation Types** 







# **Background**


- Whitchurch is in the north of Shropshire, close to the Cheshire border. It is the sixth largest town in the county.
- Until recently, the library has been located in the Civic Centre building in the town centre. However, the presence of RAAC throughout the building has forced its closure; the library is now being accommodated in St Mary's Arcade.
- The library catchment covers an area of approximately 11,892 hectares within Shropshire which is about 3.7% of the county's land mass. The catchment extends outside Shropshire, into Cheshire and also Wrexham, with 38% of the catchment outside Shropshire.
- The total population within the Whitchurch library catchment area is 19,692 comprising 8,560 households. 82.1% of the catchment population – 16,171 people are Shropshire residents. In terms of the Shropshire population it serves, Whitchurch is the sixth largest catchment.

### **Opening Hours**

The library is open 30.5 hours a week (as of March 2025) according to the following schedule:




# **Library Users**

- Whitchurch library had 921 active users in the 2024/25 financial year. This is the equivalent of 2.8% of all Shropshire library users (excluding mobile library users and Stoke Heath).
- 4.6% of the Whitchurch catchment population are active library users, which is much lower than the Shropshire average. It includes usage at all libraries, not just Whitchurch.
- Just over two-thirds of users are female (2023/24 financial year).
- The age breakdown of users (2024/25) is shown in the adjacent chart.
- Compared with the Shropshire profile of library users, there are slightly more children and young people as well as more users aged 65 and above.

#### Whitchurch: Number of Active Users




#### **Breakdown of Whitchurch Library Users by Age**



- As in all locations, the number of users fell significantly during the pandemic – subsequently, there has been considerable recovery although the library closure has clearly impacted on user numbers in 2023/24 and 2024/25.
- The decrease in users between 2019/20 and 2024/25 is 1,590 users (-63.3%). This compares with an average decline in users of 16.9% across all 21 Shropshire libraries.
- The number of visits in 2024/25 stood at 5,628, which is the equivalent of about 6 visits on average per active user.
- Footfall plummeted in 2020/21 when libraries were mostly closed for business and the frequency with which users visit the library has not yet recovered to pre-pandemic levels (26 visits per user in 2019/20).
- The overall number of visits was 91.4% lower in 2024/25 than in 2019/20.
- 9,184 loans were made in 2024/25, which equates with 10 per active user and 1.6 per visit.
- The number of loans decreased by 47% between 2023/24 and 2024/25.
- The number of requests received by the library rose by 35% in 2024/25 compared with 2023/24.

#### **Geographic Location of Library Users**

- 73.8% of all Whitchurch library users live within the main catchment area.
- 49.9% live within the Whitchurch town council area.
- 3.8% of the population in the catchment area are Whitchurch active library users. The percentage of the population using the library according to each output area in the catchment ranges from less than 1% to 8.7%. Please note that this includes only library users with an accurate and complete postcode.
- Of the 26.2% of Whitchurch library users that do not live in the catchment, small numbers live in Wem, Market Drayton, Oswestry, Ellesmere and Shrewsbury catchments.
- People that live in the Whitchurch catchment but use a different library are most likely to use Market Drayton, Shrewsbury or Wem libraries.
- Over the six months to March 2025, 71.6% of all visits to libraries made by users registered with Whitchurch library were to Whitchurch, and these accounted for 64.8% of all issues. These proportions will have been impacted by the library being closed for some of this period.
- Other libraries visited by users registered to Whitchurch include Market Drayton, Wem, Oswestry and Shrewsbury as well as the Owen mobile service.



#### Access

- Whitchurch is in north Shropshire with strong road links via the A41 and A49 and it is also on the rail network on the Manchester to Shrewsbury line.
- The closest library is Wem, which is located 9 miles away. According to the AA route planner, drive time between the two libraries is 18 minutes.
- Wem can also be accessed by train, with a journey time of approximately 12 minutes.
- Other libraries within a 25-minute drive include Ellesmere and Nantwich, which is in Cheshire.

#### Costs

- Whitchurch is the sixth most expensive library in Shropshire to operate (for Shropshire Council) but is the least expensive of the main six libraries.

- Whitchurch library is more expensive than average per book loan, per visit, per user and per hour open. These figures have been impacted by the library's enforced closure for part of 2024/25.






#### **Whitchurch: Occupation Types**






